RECOMMENDATION REPORT

BACKGROUND:

Pursuant to section 76 of the *Education Act*, a board shall provide a copy of the bylaws passed to the Minister of Education before December 31 in the year prior to an election year. Administration reviewed Bylaw 005/17 and proposes the following amendments:

- An update to the corporate name from The Board of Trustees of Elk Island Public Schools Regional Division No. 14 to The Board of Trustees of Elk Island Public Schools (Ministerial Order #008/2020); and
- 2. An update to reference the Education Act.
- 3. Repeal Bylaw 005/17. Consistent with prior years, it is much cleaner to approve a new bylaw than create amendments.

There are no other changes (no changes to wards and electoral subdivisions). Attachment 1 demonstrates the proposed changes on Bylaw 005/17. Attachment 2 is the new proposed Bylaw 007/20.

In accordance with the Board Procedures Regulation 82/2019, section 6, Readings of bylaws:

- (1) Every bylaw of a board must have 3 distinct separate readings before the bylaw is passed.
- (2) Not more than 2 readings of a bylaw must be given at any one meeting unless the trustees present at the meeting unanimously agree to give the bylaw a 3rd reading.
- (3) The first reading of a bylaw must be read in full and, if each board member has in the member's possession a written, printed or electronic copy of the bylaw, the 2nd and 3rd readings may be in title and description only.

Appendix A to Board Policy 7: Board Operations, is the bylaw on The Establishment of Wards and Electoral Subdivisions. We have also included a recommendation to replace Appendix A.

Appendix B to Board Policy 7: Board Operations, is the jurisdiction map. As there are no changes to this, there is no need to replace the map.

PURSUANT TO THE REGIONAL AGREEMENT AND SUBSEQUENT ORDERS IN COUNCIL NOS. 579/94 and 692/94 and MINISTERIAL ORDERS 082/94, 164/94, 165/94, 166/94 and 167/94.

AND WHEREAS STRATHCONA COUNTY (hereinafter called "the County") and the LAMONT COUNTY (hereinafter collectively called "the Participating Boards") entered into a Regional Agreement (hereinafter called the "Regional Agreement") to form a Regional Division to be called the ELK ISLAND REGIONAL DIVISION (hereinafter called the "Regional Division").

AND WHEREAS the Regional Agreement provides for the establishment of the Regional Division and the inclusion of the area comprising the County and the CITY OF FORT SASKATCHEWAN in the Regional Division.

AND WHEREAS Ministerial Order 082/94 established the Elk Island Regional Division No. 14 effective January 1, 1995.

AND WHEREAS Order in Council 579/94 repealed Ministerial Order No. 082/94 and, established the GREATER ELK ISLAND REGIONAL DIVISION NO. 14. Order in Council 579/94 established a portion of the County of Minburn No. 27 as a ward of the Regional Division, specified the number of trustees to be elected to the Board of Trustees for each Ward and the electoral subdivisions.

AND WHEREAS Order in Council 692/94 amended Order in Council 579/94 to change the name of the Greater Elk Island Regional Division No. 14 to the ELK ISLAND PUBLIC SCHOOLS REGIONAL DIVISION NO. 14 effective January 1, 1995.

AND WHEREAS the Minister of Education, by Ministerial Orders 164/94, 165/94, 166/94 and 167/94, realigned the boundaries of a number of public school districts located in the COUNTY OF MINBURN NO. 27 to have the named areas included in the portion of the County of Minburn No. 27 Ward in Elk Island Public Schools Regional Division No. 14.

AND WHEREAS Ministerial Order 034/2019 continued the Elk Island Public Schools
Regional Division No. 14 as THE ELK ISLAND SCHOOL DIVISION and the Board of Trustees

of Elk Island Public Schools Regional Division No. 14 as THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF ELK ISLAND SCHOOL DIVISION effective September 1, 2019.

AND WHEREAS Ministerial Order 008/2020 approved a change in the corporate name of the Board of Trustees of Elk Island School Division to THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF ELK ISLAND PUBLIC SCHOOLS effective January 21, 2020.

NOW THEREFORE, in accordance with s. 262(5)76 of the School Education Act, the THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF ELK ISLAND PUBLIC SCHOOLS Board of Trustees (hereinafter called the "Board") of ELK ISLAND PUBLIC SCHOOLS REGIONAL DIVISION NO. 14, enacts as follows:

- (1) Effective with the general election in October 20172021, the number of trustees to be elected to the Board for each Ward shall be
 - (a) one trustee for the County of Minburn No. 27 Ward;
 - (b) one trustee for the Lamont County Ward; and
 - (c) seven trustees from the Strathcona County Ward
- (2) The election of the trustee for the County of Minburn No. 27 Ward shall be by the general vote of the electors;
- (3) The election of the trustee for the Lamont County Ward shall be by the general vote of the electors;
- (4) The election of trustees in the Strathcona County Ward shall be by electoral subdivisions as follows:
 - (a) Electoral Subdivision #1 shall be comprised of all the lands lying within the corporate limits of the City of Fort Saskatchewan.;
 - (i) Two (2) trustees shall be elected from Electoral Subdivision #1.
 - (b) Electoral Subdivision #2 shall be comprised of all Strathcona County municipal lands lying within the urban ward boundaries described in Strathcona County's Municipal Ward Boundaries & Council Composition Bylaw 22-2016 as shown on Enclosure 1.
 - (i) Three (3) trustees shall be elected from Electoral Subdivision #2.
 - (c) Electoral Subdivision #3 shall be comprised of all Strathcona County municipal lands lying north of Secondary Highway 630 (Wye Road) excluding the lands within the urban ward boundaries described in Strathcona County's Municipal Ward Boundaries & Council Composition Bylaw 22-2016 as shown on Enclosure 1.
 - (i) One (1) trustee shall be elected from Electoral Subdivision #3.
 - (d) Electoral Subdivision #4 shall be comprised of all Strathcona County municipal lands lying south of Secondary Highway 630 (Wye Road) excluding the lands

within the urban ward boundaries described in Strathcona County's Municipal Ward Boundaries and Council Composition Bylaw 22-2016 as shown in Enclosure 1.

(i) One (1) trustee shall be elected from Electoral Subdivision #4.

AND WHEREAS STRATHCONA COUNTY (hereinafter called "the County") and the LAMONT COUNTY (hereinafter collectively called "the Participating Boards") entered into a Regional Agreement (hereinafter called the "Regional Agreement") to form a Regional Division to be called the ELK ISLAND REGIONAL DIVISION (hereinafter called the "Regional Division").

AND WHEREAS the Minister of Education, by Ministerial Orders 164/94, 165/94, 166/94 and 167/94, realigned the boundaries of a number of public school districts located in the COUNTY OF MINBURN NO. 27 to have the named areas included in the portion of the County of Minburn No. 27 Ward in Elk Island Public Schools Regional Division No. 14.

AND WHEREAS Ministerial Order 034/2019 continued the Elk Island Public Schools Regional Division No. 14 as THE ELK ISLAND SCHOOL DIVISION and the Board of Trustees of Elk Island Public Schools Regional Division No. 14 as THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF ELK ISLAND SCHOOL DIVISION effective September 1, 2019.

AND WHEREAS Ministerial Order 008/2020 approved a change in the corporate name of the Board of Trustees of Elk Island School Division to THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF ELK ISLAND PUBLIC SCHOOLS effective January 21, 2020.

NOW THEREFORE, in accordance with s. 76 of the *Education Act*, the THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF ELK ISLAND PUBLIC SCHOOLS (hereinafter called the "Board"), enacts as follows:

Typically, Alberta Education provides funding for new modular classrooms and relocating modular classrooms when enrolment pressures at a school are projected to exceed and remain above 100 per cent utilization. Funding for demolishing modular classrooms is usually granted by Alberta Education if health and safety issues are identified. Alberta Education also considers enrolment pressures within the context of the

surrounding schools. For this reason, EIPS evaluates modular classroom needs at the school level and considers enrolment and space requirements at the sector level when developing its modular classroom request.

Modular classrooms are flexible infrastructure and should be deployed to meet short-term enrolment issues across the Division.

Table 1 demonstrates funding for modular classroom has not kept pace with the Division needs. In June 2019, the Board of Trustees approved an expenditure of \$300,000 from the Division's unallocated reserves to fund the relocation of three modular classrooms from Mundare School to SouthPointe School. When SouthPointe School opened in 2017, it had four modular classrooms at a capacity of 556 student spaces. With the additional three modular classrooms from Mundare School, the student capacity increased to 597 at SouthPointe School. In 2019-20, EIPS completed the relocated one modular classroom to SouthPointe School from Wye Elementary raising the net capacity to 645 student spaces. To accommodate the school's intended buildout capacity, of 800

student spaces, an additional eight modular classrooms are required. Recent conversations with the City of Fort Saskatchewan confirmed SouthPointe School can accommodate a total of 16 modular classrooms.

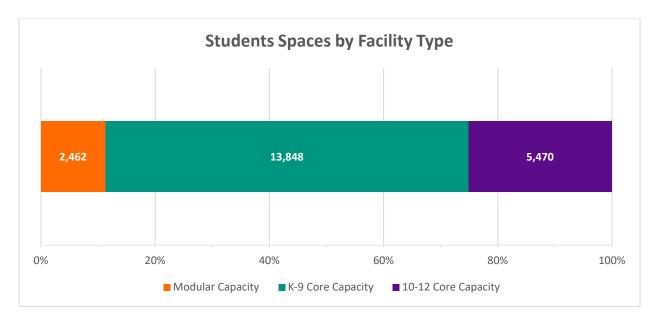
Overall, EIPS has 118 modular classrooms located at 18 school facilities. It's important to note, four modular classrooms—two at Westboro Elementary and two at Uncas Elementary—are exempt from instructional area calculations because they are leased for child care and daycare services.

Table 2 provides a breakdown of the number of modular classrooms, the average age and the total student capacity of the modular classrooms at each school. The table also categorizes modular classrooms by instructional and non-instructional.

The average age of modular classrooms across the Division has decreased to 15 years from 19 years because of the demolition of eight modular classrooms at Wye Elementary. While the decrease in average age represents a positive direction, the data in Table 2 indicates many schools have old modular classrooms that are well beyond their anticipated lifecycle of 25 years. Table 2 also illustrates modular classrooms account for 2,462 student spaces across the Division. See Appendix B for detailed breakdown of modular classrooms by school by sector has been.

EIPS has a total capacity of 21,780 student spaces. As shown in the figure below modular classrooms account for 12 per cent of the Division's total capacity. The management and effective use of these spaces are vital to accommodating students over the short and medium term.



The above figure represents the proportion of student spaces categorized by facility type.

- Modular capacity accounts for the 114 modular classrooms identified as instructional space in the 2019-20 Area Capacity and Utilization Report (ACU).
- Kindergarten to Grade 9 core capacity accounts for all kindergarten to Grade 9 student spaces in core infrastructure.
- Grades 10 to 12 core capacity accounts for all Grade 10 to Grade 12 student spaces in core infrastructure.

NOTE: The data includes Fort Saskatchewan Christian and excludes Strathcona Christian Elementary and Strathcona Christian Academy.

2.0 Determination of Need

Conversations with Alberta Education indicated funding for new modular classrooms and the relocation of modular classrooms occurs when enrolment pressures at a school are projected to exceed 100 per cent utilization. Funding for the demolishing modular classrooms is usually granted by Alberta Education if health and safety issues. Alberta Education also considers enrolment pressures within the context of the surrounding schools. For this reason, EIPS evaluates modular classroom needs at the school level and considers enrolment and space requirements at the sector level when developing all modular classroom requests.

The foundation of the analysis focused on a review of the 2019-20 Area Capacity and Utilization Report, which looks at 35 of the Division's 43 schools—colony schools, Strathcona Christian Academy Elementary, Strathcona Christian Academy Secondary, Next Step and Elk Island Youth Ranch Learning Centre are not considered. In developing this report historical utilization rates and enrolment projections were reviewed for all 35 schools. Of the 35 schools, 13 had utilization rates at or above 80 per cent. Enrolment projections and the outcomes of the 2020-21 Modular Classroom Plan support the inclusion of SouthPointe School.

Table 3 outlines the official and projected utilization rates for the 13 schools with utilization Rates above 80 per cent in the 2019-20 ACU report and SouthPointe School. The table also estimates each school's utilization for the next five years. Estimated utilization rates are based on adjusted enrolment projections. The net capacity of schools is adjusted to reflect the 2019-20 summer modular projects.

Enrolment projections for six facilities indicate an overall declining enrolment. These schools include Brentwood Elementary, Wes Hosford Elementary, Win Ferguson Elementary, Lakeland Ridge, École Campbelltown and F.R. Haythorne Junior High. It is anticipated Ardrossan Elementary and Sherwood Heights Junior High will have immediate enrolment increases, followed by a continued enrolment decline. No additional modular classrooms are required for these schools to accommodate their anticipated enrolment for the 2021-22 school year.

While additional modular classrooms are not required at Win Ferguson Elementary, the average age of the 12 modular classrooms is 30 years. A hazardous material assessment was completed on the eight of the 12 modular classrooms that exceed the 25-year life expectancy. These modular classrooms were assessed for hazardous building materials. No immediate concerns were identified. Since the modular classrooms at Win Ferguson Elementary account for nearly half of the school's capacity ensuring the modular classrooms are in working condition is critical to supporting the enrolment pressures within Sector 3 schools. Further structural assessments of the modular classrooms completed by Facilities Services staff have identified no additional concerns.

The enrolment at the remaining six facilities is anticipated to trend upwards for the duration of the five-year window.

Mills Haven Elementary is anticipated to rise to 94 per cent utilization by the 2024-25 school year—up from 80 per cent in 2019-20. The overall increase at Mills Haven Elementary is significant, and enrolment should be monitored. However, current projections do not indicate the need for additional modular classrooms for the 2021-22 school year. The four modular classrooms at Mills Haven Elementary are in good condition with two constructed in 2016 and two in 2017.

James Mowat Elementary is anticipated to reach 100 per cent utilization by 2023-24 school year and remaining near full capacity for the 2024-25 school year. The average age of the school's nine modular classrooms is 37 years. EIPS conducted a hazardous material assessment on eight modular classrooms to identify areas of significant concern. There was one concern identified that required immediate action – which has since been addressed. The modular classrooms at James Mowat Elementary account for nearly half of the school's capacity. As such, EIPS plans to conduct further assessment of the structural components to identify any additional concerns.

Davidson Creek Elementary is expected to gradually increase in enrolment, rising to a 104 per cent utilization by the 2024-25 school year—the school's current utilization is at 94 per cent. The boundary for Davidson Creek Elementary was closed for the 2020-21 school year. The Division will continue to monitor the enrolment pressure going forward. Further action may be required if the enrolment pattern continues to trend upward or unforeseen increases to the entry grade occur. A utilization of 104 per cent amounts to an adjusted enrolment of 617 students, or approximately 23 students above the school's capacity.

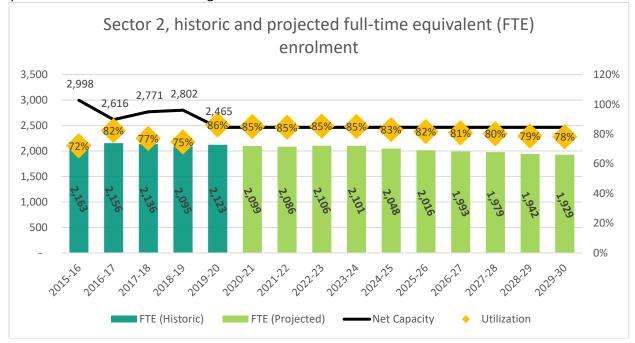
Fort Saskatchewan Christian School is expected to achieve a utilization rate of 99 per cent during the 2021-22 school year. Enrolment limitations are in place to ensure the school does not become oversubscribed. Fort Saskatchewan Christian School has three 2015 modular classrooms on site. These modular classrooms are in good condition.

Ardrossan Junior Senior High is the Division's only facility with a utilization rate exceeding 100 per cent. In the 2018-19 school year, six modular classrooms were demolished, resulting in a significant drop in available capacity. As a result, EIPS has closed the school's boundary for the 2020-21 school year. Enrolment projections indicate variable enrolment over the five-years period. It is anticipated the facility will achieve a 108 per cent utilization rate by 2023-24.

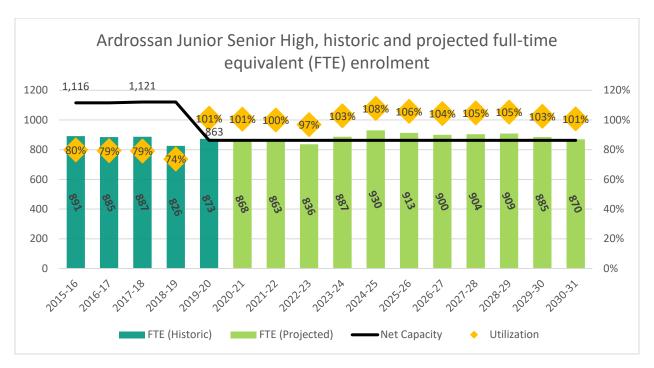
Southpoint School currently has a utilization rate below 80 per cent. The facility has maintained a closed boundary since opening in 2017. Enrolment projections indicated by 2022-23, the school will achieve a utilization rate of 108 per cent—a year earlier then Ardrossan Junior Senior High. SouthPointe School can add eight additional modular classrooms to reach the school's full buildout capacity of 800 student spaces.

Further analysis is required at both Ardrossan Junior Senior High and SouthPointe School to identify any alternative enrolment mitigation strategies.

3.0 Needs Analysis
Analysis of Ardrossan Junior Senior High



Sector 2 is anticipated to have 379 excess student spaces for the 2021-22 school year. Furthermore, enrolment projections indicate a decline in the overall utilization within the sector.



The enrolment at Ardrossan Junior Senior High is expected to maintain a utilization above 100 per cent for the 2021-22 school year. Current enrolment projections indicate the school will reach a maximum utilization rate of 108 per cent in 2024-25.

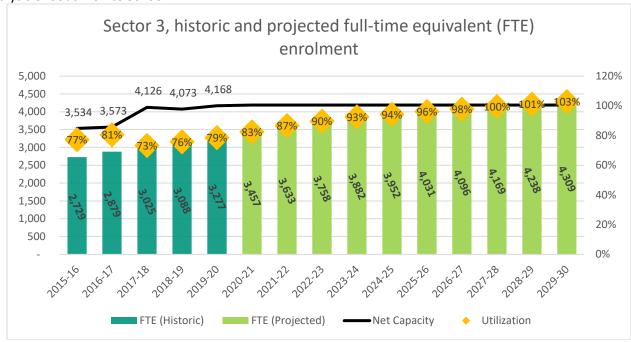

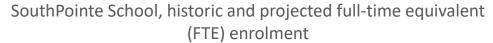
In the 2019-20 school year, the out-of-catchment and out-of-Division enrolment at Ardrossan Junior Senior High accounts for 16 per cent of the school's enrolment, or 140 students. By closing the entry grade at Ardrossan Junior Senior High, the out-of-catchment enrolment is anticipated to decline.

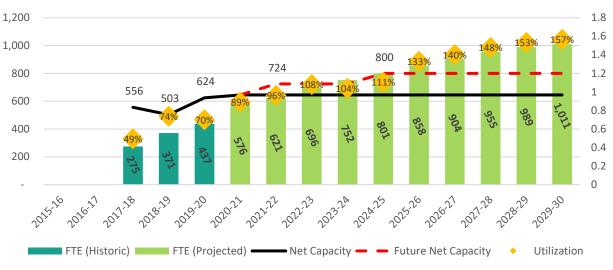
Based on current enrolment projection and the closed boundary at Ardrossan Junior Senior High, EIPS recommends monitoring the school's enrolment beyond the 2021-22 school year.

Analysis of SouthPointe School



Sector 3 is anticipated to experience significant enrolment pressure over the duration of the next 10 years. By 2023-24, the sector will surpass a 92 per cent utilization rate and continue to reach 100 per cent by 2027-28.





SouthPointe School is anticipated to have a 96 per cent utilization rate for the 2021-22 school year, if additional modular classrooms are not provided. By 2022-23, the utilization rate is projected to reach 108 per cent. However, if the four modular classrooms are provided, SouthPointe School can accommodate the anticipated student population until 2023-24, at which point additional capacity is needed. Under the current projections, SouthPointe Schools will be oversubscribed by the 2024-25 school year, regardless of the excess capacity provided through modular classrooms. In fact, all of Sector 3 will have a 94 per cent utilization rate—leaving only 250 available student spaces across all eight Sector 3 facilities.

Table 5 provides an overview of where students attending SouthPointe School come from.

In the 2019-20 school year, the out-of-catchment and out-of-Division enrolment at SouthPointe school account for eight per cent of the school's enrolment, or 35 students—20 of whom were in Grade 8. The number of students entering Southpoint School in Kindergarten remains higher than the number of students in the higher grades, which results in increasing enrolments.

Based on the current enrolment projection of SouthPointe School, Sector 3 as a whole and the limited ability of enrolment mitigation mechanism to reduce the enrolment pressure at Southpointe School. It's possible to relocated modular classrooms from Sector 1 or Sector 2 without a significant impact on the sectors' long-term ability to accommodate students. For this reason, administration is recommending the relocation of four modular classrooms to SouthPointe School.

4.0 Development of Options

To address the need for modular classrooms at SouthPointe School, EIPS must consider the type of modular classroom required and if a relocation is feasible. There are three types of modular classrooms units:

- A-Type includes a corridor;
- B-Type does not include a corridor; and
- a washroom unit available for both an A-Type and B-Type.

Each modular classroom type is also available in heavy-duty construction. Modular classrooms can be attached directly to a school or attached to a school using a connecting link. The cost of a connecting link is the responsibility of the Division.

SouthPointe School was designed to accommodate 16 modular classrooms of various design types. There are currently eight modular classrooms on-site leaving room for an additional eight. The modular classrooms selected for relocation must consider the donor school's future enrolment and modular type to minimize conflict at the receiving school. The three modular classrooms relocated to SouthPointe School from Mundare School were A-Type units. In addition, the modular classroom relocated to SouthPointe School from Wye Elementary was an A-Type unit. As such, SouthPointe School requires four B-Type units to join the relocated modular classrooms from Mundare School and Wye Elementary. The remaining four units are planned for along the gym and should be A-Type units.

4.1 Summary of Options

Option 1

- Two modular classrooms from Pine Street Elementary
- Two modular classrooms form École Campbelltown

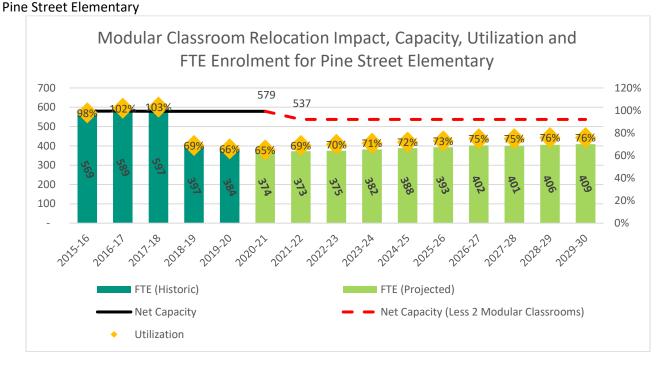

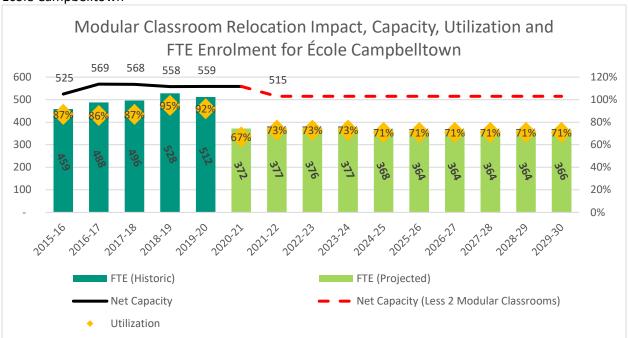

Option 1



Should two modular classrooms be removed from Pine Street Elementary, the school would experience a maximum utilization of 76 per cent between 2028-29 and 2029-30. If the two modular classrooms are removed, the school would have a net capacity of 537 student spaces. Under current conditions, enrolment projections indicate the school would maintain or exceed 128 empty student spaces throughout the 10-year horizon. Anticipated enrolment from the Hillshire development is incorporated into the enrolment projection. In conversations with the developers, EIPS assumes a 15-year construction period with an absorption rate of 40 units to 50 units per year.

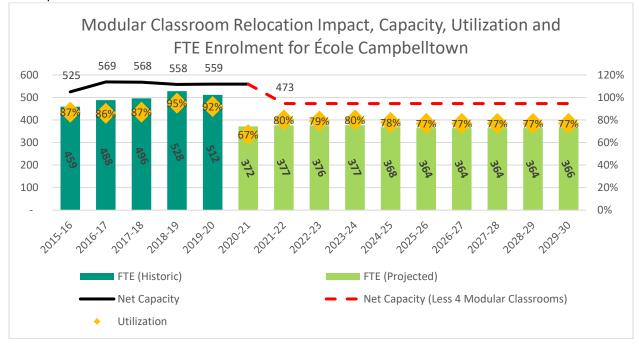
École Campbelltown



Should two modular classrooms be removed from École Campbelltown, the school would experience a maximum utilization of 73 per cent between 2021-22 and 2023-24. If the two modular classrooms are removed, the school would have a net capacity of 515 student spaces. Under current conditions, enrolment projections indicate the school would maintain a minimum of 138 empty student spaces throughout the 10-year horizon.

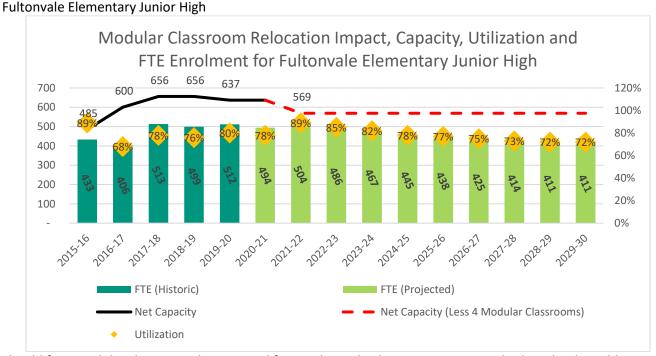
Option 2

École Campbelltown



Should four modular classrooms be removed from École Campbelltown, the school would experience a maximum utilization of 80 per cent between 2021-22 and 2023-24. If the four modular classrooms are removed, the school would have a net capacity of 473 student spaces. Under current conditions, enrolment projections indicate the school would maintain a minimum of 96 empty student spaces throughout the 10-year horizon.

Option 2



Should four modular classrooms be removed from Fultonvale Elementary Junior High, the school would experience a maximum utilization of 89 per cent in 2021-22. Under current conditions, enrolment projections indicate the school would maintain or exceed 64 empty student spaces throughout the 10-year horizon.

- In urban areas, school jurisdictions must identify an entire school for designation as a Special Needs, K&E or ESL School.
- In rural areas, school jurisdictions must identify a separate wing of a school as a Special Needs, K&E or ESL school.
- School jurisdictions may apply to Education to have a school or portion of a school (rural areas only) designated as a Special Needs, K&E or ESL School.

Education, in consultation with Infrastructure, will review the designation application. Infrastructure will also review the proposed facility to determine its ability to accommodate these programs. If the application and facility are acceptable, a school (urban location) or separate wing of a school (rural location) will be designated as a Special Needs, K&E or ESL school.

The Student Allowance Factors for these schools are 3.0 for students with severe disabilities and 1.5 for students with mild/moderate disabilities, K&E and ESL students.

The enrolment of the designated school or wing of a school will be included in the calculation of a jurisdiction's utilization rate, but will be excluded from a geographic sector utilization rate.

Annual Updates and Review Process

Each year school jurisdictions will be required to send updates to the Instructional Area Forms (Form 18) for each of their schools. This should include any changes to the instructional area (i.e., through the addition or removal of modulars), and any changes to the exempt space. In addition, for any new schools, jurisdictions are required to submit a new Instructional Area Form, as well as the small scale plans and data sheets to edc.cpdata@gov.ab.ca for review.

Each year school jurisdictions will be sent Area, Capacity, Utilization (ACU) reports with detailed information on each of their schools. These include information on gross area, instructional area, rated areas, adjusted enrolment, capacity (based on the Instructional Area form), and utilization rates. Utilization rates are provided for each individual school, for the jurisdiction overall, for open schools in the jurisdiction and for closed schools in the jurisdiction. Combined utilization rates do not include outreach facilities. If a jurisdiction identifies errors or omissions with the information on the ACU reports, they should contact Education, Capital Planning by email at edc.cpdata@gov.ab.ca to request a review. The email should include a detailed description of the concerns. If the concerns are related to capacity, the small scale plan and instructional area form along with room numbers, the room purpose, and a clear explanation of the issue or concern, should be included.

Education and Infrastructure will review the request and provide a response to the jurisdiction. In some cases the jurisdiction may be required to provide additional information.

10. Modular Classroom Program

Modular Classrooms are standard classroom units built at a central location and transported to schools across Alberta.

Funding is provided for modular classrooms to ease enrolment pressures in communities where school jurisdictions are experiencing high student enrolment growth. Modular classrooms are provided to address increases in enrolments and may be removed as enrolment declines. Funding may also be provided for new modular classrooms to replace older portable classrooms where there are demonstrated health and safety concerns.

The modular classroom program does not apply to modular classrooms that are part of a new or replacement school or a modernization capital project. Additionally this program does not include modular classrooms for decanting.

Modular classroom units meet specifications that ensure significantly improved heating and ventilation, soundproofing, resistance to mold, ease of serviceability and several other factors that differentiate them from the older portable classroom units located at schools throughout the province. The Government of Alberta plans to replace all of the older portable units with modular classrooms as funding becomes available for evergreening.

Modular classroom units can be requested each year in early November through the Modular Submission Process.

Infrastructure has developed plans and specifications for modular classrooms that are used in the manufacturing of all classroom units. School jurisdictions are expected to use only modular classrooms built to government specifications. If the school jurisdiction wishes to use a different plan, it must submit its equivalent plans to the Ministers of Education and Infrastructure for review and approval. Drawings and specifications for modular classrooms are available from the Infrastructure Learning Facilities Branch.

Jurisdictions who wish to purchase modular classrooms outside of the modular classroom program may do so under the GOA's current contract or through their own contractor. Should the jurisdiction choose to use their own contractor they must follow all contracting and tendering requirements.

If a P3 school is fully built out to its approved capacity and the jurisdiction wishes to add additional modular classrooms this will be outside of the P3 contract and will require the jurisdictions to cover 100% of the cost to procure and set-up the modular unit. Jurisdictions should consult with their Education Senior Manager in Capital Planning as there will be implications to the DBFM agreement.

10.1 Modular Classroom Links

Modular classrooms can be attached directly to a school, attached to a school using a connecting link, or remain a freestanding unit (i.e., not attached to the main school structure). A connecting link is the connecting corridor used to attach the modular classrooms to the permanent building.

The width of the modular connecting link can be adjusted to meet site conditions. A standard modular connecting link is available and has been designed to be used in conjunction with the standard modular classrooms and uses the same materials and finishes. The ends of the modular connecting links:

- are open ended to allow connection to the school building and modular classrooms;
- have double doors on one sidewall; and
- have windows on the opposite sidewall.

School jurisdictions are expected to use the standard modular connecting link, instead of site built, wood frame construction connecting links, wherever possible. If a site built, wood frame constructed link is deemed necessary, it should be no larger than is necessary to provide

sufficient setback from the permanent structure to meet the Alberta Building Code requirements for fire separation.

10.2 Procedures for the Modular Classroom Program

Each year, in October, Alberta Education requests jurisdictions to submit their requirements for modular units and the relocation of existing modular classrooms or free-standing portable classrooms to address enrolment pressures, health and safety issues and evergreening. Jurisdictions are required to complete forms as part of the application process (see Form 9 in Appendices and online at

http://education.alberta.ca/department/ipr/capitalplanning/infrastructureresources.aspx).

The submissions are due to Alberta Education by November 1st of each year and will include a prioritized list of requested units that identifies the number of units required, the school(s) to which the units are to be allocated and other necessary information as outlined in the forms.

Upon approval of new modular classrooms, jurisdictions will appoint a consultant and design team. Boards are required to submit a site plan and cost sheet to Infrastructure and Education for review and approval. Upon receipt of the completed prep sheets the jurisdiction will receive 90 per cent of the provincial funding.

Once approved, Infrastructure will order the units(s) from the manufacturer and advise the jurisdiction to proceed with the development of a pre-tender package, which includes drawings, specifications, and a cost estimate, for the delivery and set up of the modular units.

Jurisdictions must submit the pre-tender package with a letter requesting permission to tender to Infrastructure for review. Bids that are greater than \$200,000 will require approval from the Contract Review Committee (CRC) prior to the jurisdiction entering into a contract for set-up and delivery.

Jurisdictions must ensure that they are following all relevant contract legislation and requirements, including the New West Partnership Trade Agreement and the *School Building and Tendering Regulation*.

After jurisdictions award the contract, the jurisdiction or the contractor must apply for a development and building permit(s). It is suggested that jurisdictions hand over the modular site to an installation and works contractor and commence site work at least two months prior to the opening of the modular classrooms. Jurisdictions need to coordinate delivery of modular units to meet this two month recommendation.

Jurisdictions are to provide confirmation to Alberta Infrastructure when modular space is operational, and supply project plans to ensure that school capacity information is updated.

The funding allocation for furniture and equipment for new modular units is \$12,000 per unit and the allowable consultants fees are up to a maximum of 12.58 per cent of the delivery, set-up and link project costs (excludes purchase of the unit and F&E).

If the school jurisdiction has not ordered the approved modular classrooms within six months of the approval date, the approval and all associated funding may be rescinded and the modular classrooms reallocated to the next highest provincial priority. Jurisdictions are required to submit their Statement of Final Costs (SFC) for all modular projects within six months of the completion of the installation and set-up. The statement of final costs is reviewed by Infrastructure and Education. Once the SFC has been approved the provincial portion of the actual expenditures up to the remaining 10 per cent will be forwarded to the jurisdiction.

10.3 Relocation of Portables/Modular Classrooms

Funding may be available for the relocation of portables and modular classrooms from an existing school (donor school) to another school (receiver school) for the purpose of easing enrolment pressures at the receiver school. Modular relocation requests should be submitted through the annual Modular Submission Process.

Request for approval for the relocation of modular classrooms is similar to requesting new units. See Form 10 in Appendices and online at http://education.alberta.ca/department/ipr/capitalplanning/infrastructureresources.aspx) for details of the specific information required for the submissions.

Upon approval of modular relocations, boards will be required to submit a site plan and relocation cost sheet to Infrastructure for review. Once approved, Infrastructure will advise the jurisdiction to proceed with the development of a pre-tender package, which includes drawings, specifications, and an updated cost estimate, for the set-up and delivery of the units.

Jurisdictions must submit the pre-tender package with a letter requesting permission to tender to Infrastructure for review. Bids that are greater than \$200,000 will require approval from the CRC prior to the board entering into a contract for set-up and delivery. There is no furniture and equipment allocation for modular relocations and the consultants' fees are to a maximum of 12.58 per cent of the delivery, set-up and link project costs.

Jurisdictions must ensure that they are following all relevant contract legislation and requirements, including the New West Partnership Trade Agreement and the *School Building and Tendering Regulation*.

If the school jurisdiction has not completed the approved modular move within six months of the approval date, the approval and all associated funding may be rescinded.

Jurisdictions are required to submit their Statement of Final Costs (SFC) for all modular relocation projects within six months of the delivery of the unit to its new location. The statement of final costs is reviewed by Infrastructure and Alberta prior to the release of the final 10 per cent of funds.

10.4 Declaration of Surplus Modular Classrooms

When a jurisdiction finds that they have a modular classroom that is no longer needed to accommodate the instructional needs of students, they are to advise Education of the surplus unit(s) through the completion and submission of the Declaration of Surplus Modular Classrooms Form. See Form 16 in the Appendices and online at http://www.education.alberta.ca/department/ipr/capitalplanning/infrastructureresources.aspx

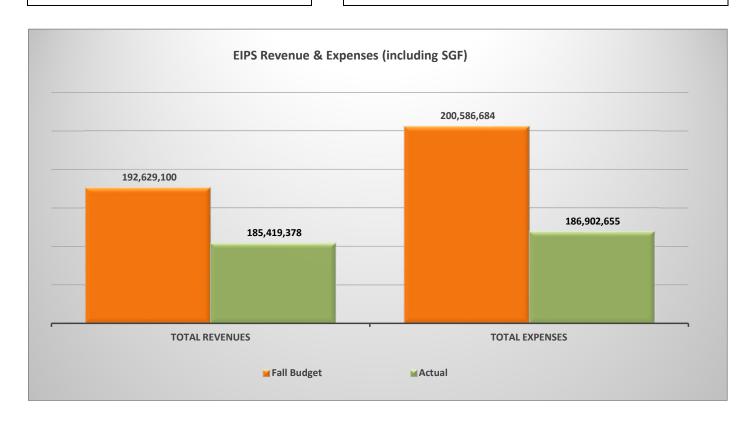

The COVID-19 pandemic and resulting closure of in-school classes had a significant impact on EIPS. Provincial funding was reduced by \$2.36M in base instruction funding, as well as \$1.25M in transportation funding. In terms of expenses, school and department activities have been impacted drastically, with services being modified, reduced, or eliminated across every facet of EIPS's operations.

Infrastructure Maintenance and Renewal spending is \$1,128,000 below budget, as EIPS focused on completing Capital Maintenance Renewal (CMR) projects, as this grant had a stricter timeframe for spending. IMR grant revenue is recognized to match expenses as they are incurred.



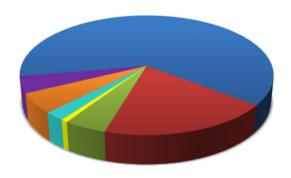

Revenues by Object



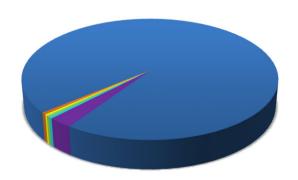

Revenues by Source



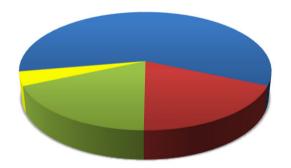

Expenses by Object



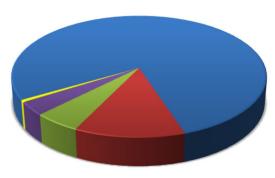

Elk Island Public Schools Revenue Notes For The Year Ended August 31, 2020

A. Base Funding – Base Instruction (Gr 10-12)

Actual revenue for Credit Enrolment Units were greater than budget, most notably at Salisbury Composite High and Outreach sites.

B. Base Funding – Base Instruction Reduction

As a result of the pandemic and subsequent cancellation of in-school classes, Alberta Education reduced base instruction funding from EIPS's original entitlement.

C. Transportation Funding

As a result of the pandemic and subsequent cancellation of in-school classes, Alberta Education reduced transportation funding from the EIPS's original entitlement.

D. Infrastructure Maintenance Renewal (IMR)

Revenue has been recognized to match IMR project expenses incurred to August 31, 2020. The revenue variance is offset by an equal variance in expenses, resulting in no impact to the bottom line.

IMR projects are classified as either operating or capital, as per accounting standards. Revenue and expenses for operating IMR projects are recorded in EIPS's statements the year the project is undertaken. Capital IMR projects are recorded in EIPS's statements slowly over a number of years.

IMR operating and capital spending was lower than budget due to the new Capital Maintenance and Renewal (CMR) funding of \$3.9M approved in May 2020. CMR capital projects took precedence over IMR projects as the CMR funding had more restricted spending timelines set by the province.

Details on spending on operating and capital IMR projects and CMR capital projects are included in the tables below:

E. Other – Regional Collaborative Service Delivery (RCSD)

Additional billing was granted to cover costs associated with the closing of the program at the end of the 2019-20 school year.

F. Fees

As a result of the pandemic and subsequent cancellation of in-school classes, transportation services were no longer being provided by EIPS as of mid-March. As a result, the annual transportation fees paid by parents were not fully recognized as revenue and are therefore below budget.

G. Investment Income

Interest earned on the bank account was higher than budgeted as the overall balance in the bank account was greater than originally projected.

There was also less interest paid out to trust funds and Infrastructure Maintenance and Renewal funds.

Elk Island Public Schools Expense Notes – Schools For The Year Ended August 31, 2020

A. Supports for Students (Schools) – Regional Collaborative Service Delivery

Expenses are above year to date budget as additional funding was available with the closing of the RCSD program. This expense variance is offset by a revenue variance, resulting in no impact to our bottom line.

B. Other - Other School Allocations

Expenses are below budget as a result of unallocated contingency funding, unadjusted revenue increases, and a reduction in the year-end salary expense accrual as compared to prior year.

C. Other – Standard Cost Conversion

This is comprised of the net conversion between standard costs and actual salaries charged to schools.

D. Other – Closure Adjustment

The closure adjustment budget includes allocations removed from individual school budgets, as a way of addressing the Alberta Education funding reduction (in response to in-school classes being cancelled for the remainder of the 2019-20 school year). These allocation reductions include amounts originally budgeted for staff who were temporarily laid off, as well as substitute teacher costs.

Expenses recorded here are benefit costs for classified staff during the period they were temporarily laid off.

Elk Island Public Schools Expense Notes – Central Services For The Year Ended August 31, 2020

A. Education Executive - Superintendent

Expenses are below year to date budget as funds allocated to support emergent school and department requirements have not been fully accessed. Funds allocated for the leadership workshop and planning programs were underspent as activities had to be cancelled due to COVID. As the planning program is an internally restricted program, the related surplus will be carried forward to support strategic planning.

B. Education Executive - Corporate Secretary - Election

Election expenses are being accrued annually to support expected costs of the next board election (expected to be spent in 2021).

C. Supports for Students (Central) – Associate Superintendent

Expenses are below year to date budget within the First Nations Métis Inuit program due to school closures. As these are internally restricted funds and work in this area is ongoing, the surplus will be carried forward to support FNMI initiatives in the 2020-21 school year.

D. Supports for Students (Central) – Elementary Education

Expenses are below year to date budget due to specific efforts to conserve funds for expected 2020-21 curriculum costs as well as cancellation of events due to COVID. As funds for curriculum are internally restricted, the surplus in this program will be carried forward to support curriculum-related activities in the 2020-21 school year.

E. Supports for Students (Central) – Secondary Education

Expenses are below year to date budget as events were cancelled due to COVID. Dual Credit Programming funds have been spent to purchase equipment for BFH and VJS and remaining unspent funds will be carried forward to provide additional support in 2020-21.

F. Human Resources - Staff Relations & Training

Expenses are below year to date budget as physical distancing requirements legislated in response to the pandemic has resulted in EIPS professional development programming either being moved to an online (and therefore less costly) platform, rescheduled for next year, or cancelled outright.

In addition, the move to a new Enterprise Resource Planning software has lowered the costs associated with the Files Digitization project, which was completed in July.

Lower costs have also been noted in the Health Recovery, Employee Assistance, and Long Term Disability programs, which may be due partially to the pandemic, but also to the additional support available since the changeover to Alberta School Employee Benefit Plan last fall.

The CTF Bridge to Certification program is utilized to support staff earning their certification. The surplus remaining will be carried forward to provide mentorship training for staff in the program.

G. Human Resources - Recruitment & Staffing

Expenses are below year to date budget as the pandemic has curtailed the usual recruitment and staffing activities, as well as reduced costs for substitutes. Expenses related to administrative transfers are also below budget as limited transfers were required for the 2019-20 school year.

H. Facility Services – Infrastructure Maintenance & Renewal (IMR)

Revenue has been recognized to match IMR project expenses incurred to August 31, 2020. The expense variance in IMR is offset by an equal variance in revenue, resulting in no impact to the bottom line.

IMR projects are classified as either operating or capital, as per accounting standards. Revenue and expenses for operating IMR projects are recorded in EIPS's statements the year the project is undertaken. Capital IMR projects are recorded in EIPS's statements slowly over a number of years.

IMR operating and capital spending was lower than budget due to the new Capital Maintenance and Renewal (CMR) funding of \$3.9M approved in May 2020. CMR capital projects took precedence over IMR projects as the CMR funding had more restricted spending timelines set by the province.

Details on spending on operating and capital IMR projects and CMR capital projects are included in the tables below:

J. Fiscal Services – Closure Adjustment

The closure adjustment is composed of allocation reductions primarily for contracted transportation costs, due to the Alberta Education funding reduction (in response to in-school classes being cancelled for the remainder of the 2019-20 school year).

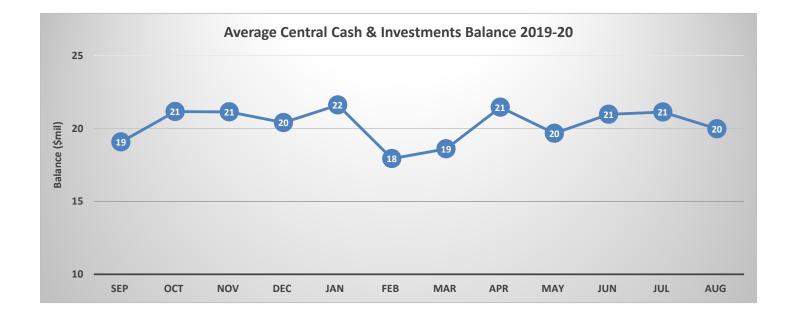

Although cash and investment balances were expected to fall over the 2019-20 year (as EIPS had planned a \$7.96 million budget deficit), cash balances ended in a similar position to prior year. Conservative spending by schools and departments was the primary contributor to this change, especially over the third and fourth quarter of the year. Maintaining that conservative approach, EIPS has not reinvested maturing investments in 2019-20 and instead transferred them to cash to allow for flexibility in the 2020-21 school year.

ISSUE:

That the Board of Trustees receive for information the Unaudited Accumulated Surplus at Aug. 31, 2020.

BACKGROUND:

Board Policy 2: Role of the Board, Section 8, Fiscal Accountability, establishes that the Board of Trustees will approve the transfer of funds to reserves.

Board Policy 7: Board Operations, Section 12.12, Trustee Compensation and Expenses, states that any Board Governance surplus exceeding the allowable carryforward amounts will be evaluated on an annual basis and placement of funds will be determined at a public meeting of the Board. The Board Governance surplus exceeding the allowable carryforward is \$0 as the Board transferred \$38,033 in the spring to support the funding reductions made by Alberta Education.

Administrative Procedure 501, Financial Management gives schools and departments the opportunity to carry forward surplus from one financial year to the next.

This approval process coincides with the year end in preparation for the finalization of the audited financial statements. The information in this report is subject to change based on the audit.

CURRENT SITUATION OR KEY POINT:

Elk Island Public Schools (EIPS) has an operating deficit of \$1.48 million for the year ended Aug. 31, 2020. This decreases the Accumulated Surplus to \$18.26 million. Accumulated surplus is the primary indicator of the financial resources that EIPS has available to provide future services. Accumulated surplus includes investment

in Board funded tangible capital assets (\$6.22 million), unrestricted surplus, operating reserves (\$11.26 million), and capital reserves (\$0.78 million).

The net reserve transfer for 2019-20 is \$0.55 million, which includes the operating deficit of \$1.48 million and a surplus of \$0.93 million from current year transactions for unsupported capital assets.

The Division has established school and department reserves, as well as capital reserves, in accordance with Board Policy.

The balance of operating reserves is \$11.26 million. Reserves of \$3.78 million are designated for use by schools and departments to support future years. Division Allocated Reserves has a balance of \$0.41 million; these reserves will be used to fund specific expenses as identified by the Board. Division Unallocated Reserves are at \$7.07 million.

The operating reserves balance is greater than the spring projection by \$2.81 million (Attachment 3 - Column H - Row M). Projections were completed in the spring of 2020 with many unknowns due to COVID-19 and the inschool class closures.

- At year end, Central Services and School reserves were \$0.42 million less than projections. At the time
 of projections (early April), school reserves were estimated at 1% of operations due to the difficulty of
 schools completing projections and departments estimating conservatively due to many unknowns.
- The Division Allocated reserves are \$0.08 million greater as the three remaining projects (Heritage Hills Elementary start-up, Enterprise Resource Planning and curriculum costs) were not completed at yearend.
- The Division Unallocated reserve is \$3.15 million greater primarily due to:
 - School surpluses greater than 1% of budgets (\$0.58 million);
 - Next Step surpluses greater than 2% of budgets (\$0.25million);
 - Department surpluses greater than 1% of budgets (\$0.20 million);
 - Department Hold Harmless program surpluses were \$1.07 million higher than projected primarily due to \$0.45 million additional savings in utilities as a result of school closures and lower utility rates, and \$0.56 million due to less medical leave time after schools closed and less private business days taken than projected;
 - In-year funding remaining at year end (\$0.14 million);
 - Standard cost deficit less than budgeted (\$0.25 million);
 - Revenue achieved greater than allocated (\$0.49 million greater than projected) due to being conservative in the spring and estimating a loss on summer school and funding shortfalls because of unearned CEU credits;
 - o Capital purchases from school and department operating budgets (\$0.14 million).

These variances were offset by COVID-related costs of \$0.10 million incurred prior to year-end.

EIPS strives to keep the Division Unallocated Reserve at a minimum of 2% of EIPS' budget (approximately \$4 million) to cover emergent issues, price fluctuations and stabilize funding in the future. At Aug. 31, 2020, the balance in this unallocated reserve is \$7.07 million (3.61% of 2020-21 budget)

The balance of capital reserves at Aug. 31, 2020 is \$0.78 million. These reserves are for the purchase of future capital assets.

Each year, Alberta Education provides a Financial Reporting Profile that compares financial information of school divisions across Alberta and to other comparably sized jurisdictions. This document allows a review and evaluation of the current financial position.

A comparison of EIPS' operating and capital reserves to other divisions is provided in the table below. The current financial position indicates a decrease to operating reserves of 0.48% or 1.21 days and a decrease to capital reserves of \$7 per student. If EIPS maintained capital reserves at the average rate, reserves would be \$4.6 million using the average rate of divisions with similar enrolment. These statistics are useful for analyzing financial health.

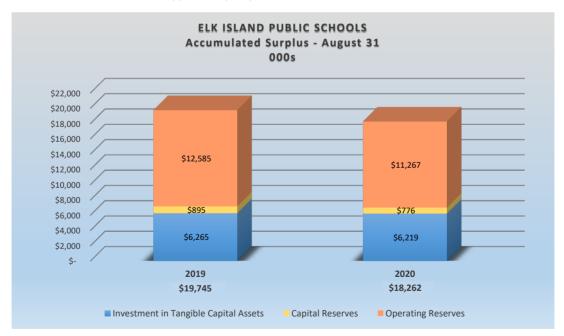

BACKGROUND:

Elk Island Public Schools (EIPS) enters student information into PowerSchool which is directly linked to the Provincial Approach to Student Information (PASI) system. Alberta Education uses the PASI system to calculate funding allocations to EIPS.

CURRENT SITUATION OR KEY POINT:

Financial Services has summarized the Sept. 30, 2020 enrolment. There are 17,001 students in the Division this fall. This is a decrease of 399 students (2.3%) from last year and a decrease of 469 students (2.7%) from the spring budget.

Attachment 2 identifies the number of in-school learners (14,978) and at-home learning (2,203) at September 20, 2020.
