Each day we will be broadcasting radio messages to help remind bus operators about some of the following topics:

Remove or Reduce Risk

Leave room. Stay back at least 4 seconds Count the kids Rock & Roll for turns Adjust your mirrors Courtesy is contagious Use your reference points If late, stay late

No Unsafe Behaviours

Never follow too closely Know where the students are Overcome blind spots Minimize blind spots Never show a bad mood Always know you can safely turn No rushing

In particular we want to focus on reminding your students to wait in the Safety Zone after being dropped off at the bus stop.

I LOVE "ROCK AND ROLL"

Sometimes there are objects that may be temporarily obstructed from the driver's seat view of a bus. We often think about this as having something in our blind-spots. These objects might only be revealed by moving forward and side-to-side in the seat. I like to call this rocking and rolling. Not only is this movement good for your back, it also helps a driver to see more of the potential hazards at an intersection.

Intersections contain many unfavorable conditions for bus operators and many collisions occur because an operator does not expect the unexpected to occur. Professional drivers are responsible for a safe and successful vehicle approach, entry and exit when dealing with intersections.

Remember these tips:

- · Scan the intersection before you arrive there
- · Take a mental snapshot of possible hazards before arriving at the intersection
- · Think about what defensive measure may have to be put in motion
- Look all around the vehicle 'Rock & Roll'
- · Proceed with caution and be prepared to take emergency evasive action when necessary
