Pathways to High School Completion

At the end of high school an individual can earn a:

- Alberta High School Diploma
- Certificate of High School Achievement
- Certificate of School Completion

Most students complete high school in three years; others may do so in four or more years.



Diploma vs. High School Achievement vs. School Completion:

- Specific courses are required for Alberta High School Diploma or Certificate of High School Achievement
- when planning in high school, students need to consider their strengths and what they are likely to do after High School (e.g. post-secondary education, apprenticeship, workforce)
 - most students obtain a High School Diploma 100 Credits
 - Certificate of High School Achievement or Certificate of School Completion pathway will involve conversation with counsellor and/or administrator prior to registration



What is a Credit?


- each course in high school has a credit value (most are 1, 3, or 5)
- credit is a unit of learning time based on hours of instruction
- 1 credit is approximately 25 hours of instruction
- at least 50% must be achieved in each course to earn the credit(s)
- students can only receive credits for a course once
- if a student chooses to repeat a course to upgrade their mark, they will be awarded the highest mark achieved but not earn any additional credits



Course Numbers

Most courses have three digits.

- the first two digits refers to the year of high school: 10 refers to Grade 10, 20 refers to Grade 11, or 30 refers to Grade 12
- the hyphenated number refers to the route of the program





The course needed to qualify for participation in a particular class is called a prerequisite. For example:

- to qualify for placement in English 20-1, English 10-1 must be successfully completed
- English 10-1 is the prerequisite for English 20-1
- Math 10C and Science 10 are prerequisites for academic 30 level Math and Science courses





Alberta High School Diploma

Minimum of 100 credits including:

- **English** 30-1 or 30-2;
- **Social Studies** 30-1 or 30-2
- Math 20-1, 20-2, or 20-3;
- Science 20 or 24, Biology 20, Chemistry 20, or Physics 20;
- Physical Education 10;
- Career and Life Management (CALM 20);
- Career and Technology Studies, Fine Arts, Second Languages, PE 20 or 30, Knowledge and Employability Occupational Courses, Registered Apprenticeship Program (RAP) – minimum of 10 credits in any combination; and
- 10 credits at the 30 level other than English or Social.



Certificate of High School Achievement

Minimum of 80 credits including:

- **English** 20-2 or 30-4;
- Math 10-3 or 20-4;
- **Science** 14 or 20-4;
- Physical Education 10;
- Career and Life Management (CALM 20);
- Career and Technology Studies (CTS) or Knowledge and Employability (K&E) Occupational Course 30 level - 5 credits; and
- K & E Workplace Practicum, Work Experience, Registered Apprenticeship Program (RAP), Green Certificate, or Special Projects 30 level-5 credits.



Alexander Rutherford Scholarship

Grade 10 Scholarship:

- Average of 75.0% to 79.9% in five subjects = \$300
- Average of 80.0% or higher in five subjects = \$400

Grade 11 Scholarship:

- Average of 75.0% to 79.9% in five subjects = \$500
- Average of 80.0% or higher in five subjects = \$800

Grade 12 Scholarship:

- Average of 75.0% to 79.9% in five subjects = \$700
- Average of 80.0% or higher in five subjects = \$1300

- English 10-1, 10-2
- Français 10-1 or 10-2

One of:

- English 20-1, 20-2
- Français 20-1 or 20-2

- A language other than one used above at the Grade 12 level.

Any two courses with minimum three credit value at Grade 10 level (1000 or 4000 series) including those listed above and combined option and introductory CTS courses.

Any two courses with minimum three credit value at Grade 11 level (2000 or 5000 series) including those listed above and combined option and intermediate CTS courses.

Any two courses with minimum five credit value at Grade 12 level (3000, 6000 or 9000 series) including those listed above and combined option and advanced CTS courses.


High School Schedule

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


Typical Progression
---- Possible Progression









Although the recommended transfer point from Science 24 is to Science 10, in exceptional cases, students may be placed by the principal in 20-level courses, as serves the student's best interests.





Career and Technology Studies (CTS) is a provincially authorized curriculum for Alberta secondary schools. CTS enables schools to design unique programs that meet the needs of students, draw on community resources, and allow for career exploration. Common examples in EIPS:

- Baking, Culinary Arts, Commercial Foods, & Personal Foods
- Communication Technology, Digital Media & Design, & Photography
- Computer Science, Computer Works, & Robotics
- Construction, Mechanics, Fabrication Welding
- Cosmetology & Esthetics
- Horticulture
- Leadership
- Personal Fitness, Sports Medicine, Sports Performance & Wellness

- follows the provincial curriculum, interpreted from a Christian perspective
- is open to students who support the Christian Academy's educational philosophy
- Open House February 15





Off Campus Education

Off Campus Education:

- allows students to explore career pathways and gain work experience usually outside the school 'walls'; work can be paid or voluntary
- can begin at 15 years of age (this could begin as soon as the summer after Grade 9)
- need to complete 1-credit HCS3000: Workplace Safety course before starting
- students earn credits toward their High School Diploma at a rate of one credit for each 25 hours of documented work; grades are calculated using student assignments and employer feedback



Work Experience:

are courses that provide experiential learning activities as part of a planned school program under the supervision of an off-campus education coordinator

Types - Off Campus Education

- students apply the knowledge, skills and attitudes acquired through other course work at the work site
- discover their career interests and aptitudes in meaningful work activities, situated in communitybased work sites
- earn up to 15 credits towards high school graduation

Types - Off Campus Education

Registered Apprenticeship Program (RAP):

- earn high school credits AND apprenticeship hours at the same time under the supervision of a journeyperson
- A real-world experience in 50+ skilled trades that can lead to a career
- once registered, the student applies for their Blue Book to log up to 1000 hours of paid work
- Careers: The Next Generation can be used to help find placements
- often requires a one semester full-time commitment, either during regular high school programming or in the year after graduation (Returning 12)





Types - Off Campus Education

Green Certificate:

 students learn on the job, under the direction of experienced farm personnel and work towards mastering all skills within their training program: Beekeeper, Cow calf beef, Dairy, Equine, Feedlot beef, Field crop, Greenhouse, Irrigated field crop, Poultry, Sheep, & Swine production.

 student gets experience, credits (up to 16), and a Green Certificate Agricultural Technician certification from Alberta Agriculture for post-secondary education or

employment



- get started on a post-secondary education while still in high school
- courses include, but not limited to, Psychology 104, Computer Science, Coding & Robotics, Automotive Service Technician
- opportunities are in partnership with Elk Island Public Schools Division, Lakeland College, Portage College, Norquest College, Olds College, and Alberta Education.
