Course Description:

Musical Theatre offers an immersive environment that emphasizes the dramatic and musical elements encompassing singing, acting, speaking, dancing, and movement within the realm of theatre studies. Students will have the opportunity to cultivate an appreciation for the intricacies involved in the creative process of staging a production. The classes will foster a positive atmosphere for group interactions, providing a supportive, non-intimidating, and stimulating setting.

Students will actively participate in all facets of producing a musical production. The selection of productions will be subject to approval by the school principal and will adhere to Administrative Procedure 205: Controversial Issues and Resources. According to Section 58.1 (1) Notice to Parent of the Education Act, "A board shall provide notice to a parent of a student where courses of study, educational programs or instructional materials, or instruction or exercises, include subject-matter that deals primarily and explicitly with religion or human sexuality."

Student Need:

Musical Theatre serves as a valuable complement to the Drama curriculum, providing students with enhanced opportunities to focus on the three fundamental aspects of musical theatre: acting, singing, and dancing. Additionally, students will gain hands-on experience in various technical elements of musical theatre, including lights, sound, set design, costume, and prop design.

The primary objective of Musical Theatre is to provide interested students with a platform to explore and nurture their artistic abilities. Through collaborative efforts, students will learn to work together to produce a theatrical production, fostering confidence in their skills as singers, actors, and/or dancers.





Scope and Sequence (Learner Outcomes):

The scope of Musical Theatre encompasses a wide range of skills and knowledge, including characterization, techniques for effective speaking and vocal projection, dancing and movement, staging, technical theatre, costuming, and backstage procedures. Students will learn to take direction and collaborate both individually and as part of a team to bring productions to life. Through their engagement in Musical Theatre, students will also develop confidence in public speaking and improvisation.
