Introduction to the Religious Studies - Christian Studies Course Sequence

Subject: Social Sciences - Discipline: Religion

Christian Studies 15-25-35 is designed for both Christian and non-Christian students. The premise of Christian Studies 15-25-35 is that personal faith impacts every aspect of life. In this course sequence, students examine key themes and teachings of Christianity and various other world religions, and consider how these impact decision-making for people of those faiths. Christian Studies 15-25-35 offers students opportunities to express differing views and interpretations based on faith, and is intended to foster sensitivity toward and valuing of different faiths. In Christian Studies 15-25-35, students are encouraged to respect and have compassion for all people, which fosters global and cultural understanding and emphasizes the importance of personal spiritual wellness.

According to the Guide to Education, ECS to Grade 12, 2022-2023, locally developed religious studies courses are required to "develop respect for and promote understanding of individual and minority group differences, and develop an understanding and appreciation of the beliefs, customs, practices, literature and traditions of other major world religions" (Alberta Education, 2022). Christian Studies 15-25-35 meets these provincial requirements by including 20 per cent course content addressing a comparative study of other major world religions, such as Islam, Judaism or Buddhism.

Student Need

Christian Studies 15-25-35 provides an opportunity for students to explore Christianity in an academic setting. In this course sequence, students explore various aspects of Christianity in a way that encourages them to think critically about religion and the development of their own personal faith. In Christian Studies 15-25-35, students gain an understanding and appreciation for the role of faith in contributing to the development of a worldview. Throughout this course sequence, students consider various viewpoints on social issues and faith-based value systems, and by doing so, develop their own worldview and gain a better understanding of what it means to live in a pluralistic, multi-faith society.

Christian Studies 15-25-35 provides students with an opportunity to develop a variety of competencies. In particular, critical thinking, collaboration, communication, citizenship and personal growth are fostered as students examine social issues and community needs, express their own beliefs and values, and gain an understanding and appreciation of the beliefs and values of others.

Courses in the Religious Studies - Christian Studies Course Sequence

Religious Studies - Christian Studies 15 (LDC1775)

In Christian Studies 15, students explore the significance of the Bible to the Christian faith, as well as the influence that other sacred texts have in major world religions. Students also examine factors that influence the development of a personal worldview and describe how their perspective can impact decision making. In this course, students explore the teachings of Jesus Christ and his example of servant leadership. Students consider how they may undertake servant leadership by identifying a need within their community and strategizing ways to address that need.

Education Act: Notice to Parent

Occasionally, issues of a sensitive or controversial nature may be encountered or explored. Teachers are advised to use their discretion and take the needs of individual students and the local community context into consideration when addressing sensitive or controversial topics or issues.

Religious Studies - Christian Studies 25 (LDC2775)

In Christian Studies 25, students examine major themes of the Bible and explain how these themes provide a framework for Christianity. Through an exploration of the teachings of key biblical leaders and reflection on their personal worldview, students recognize factors that contribute to the development of a meaningful personal faith. Students examine the beliefs and teachings of other major world religions and describe common understandings between these faiths and Christianity. In Christian Studies 25, students are encouraged to model the connection between faith and practice by creating and implementing a plan to meet an identified need within their community.

Religious Studies - Christian Studies 35 (LDC3775)

In Christian Studies 35, students examine correlations between the teachings of the Old and New Testaments and the impact of these teachings on modern Christianity. The relevance of Christian values to ethical decision making and contemporary events is analyzed. Values and teachings of other world religions are explored to help broaden understanding of the diversity of worldviews that exist within a multicultural society. Students in Christian Studies 35 demonstrate faith-based servant leadership through the implementation and evaluation of a plan to meet community or global needs.
